
Career planning tools that may assist you

Flying into the future as a drone pilot

Drones are aircrafts operated without a pilot on board, controlled remotely. Drones are also sometimes called remotely piloted aircrafts (RPAs) or unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs). Drone technology isn't all that new, it is how they are being used that is rapidly changing. Drones are now being utilised in many industries across Australia, to perform an increasingly diverse range of tasks:

- In the agriculture industry, an estimated 10% of businesses use drones to support operational processes such as planting seeds, spraying weeds, checking water levels and monitoring stock.
- In the mining and construction industries they are used to identify hazards, measure stockpiles and inspect infrastructure such as power lines, bridges and rail lines.
- The Defence Force use them for surveillance and intelligence gathering activities.
- In the arts and media industries, they are used by directors and artists to push the boundaries of creativity in advertising, synchronised light show displays, photography, film and TV.

How knowing your values can positively impact your career

Values shape the career choices we make, but what exactly are values and how can you identify the values that are important to you; those that will positively impact your career? You should know which workplace values are important to you and how they can shape the decisions you make.

Sabina Read identifies some common values to help you start thinking about what's important to you. They are listed below. Ask yourself, which of these values are important to you and whether there are any you want to add.

- Adventure: To actively seek, create, or explore novel or stimulating experiences
- Assertiveness: To respectfully stand up for my rights and request what I want
- Authenticity: To be genuine, real; to be true to myself
- Caring: To be considerate towards myself, others, the environment
- Challenge: To keep encouraging myself to grow, learn, improve
- Cooperation: To be cooperative and collaborative with others
- Creativity: To be innovative
- Curiosity: To be open-minded and interested; to explore and discover
- Fairness: To be honest with myself and others
- **Humour:** To see and appreciate the funny side of life
- Independence: To be self-supportive, and choose my own way of doing things
- **Open-mindedness:** To see things through/from other's points of view, and weigh evidence fairly
- Power: To strongly influence or wield authority over others, e.g., taking charge, leading, organising
- Respect: To be thoughtful towards myself or others; to be polite and show positive regard
- **Self-development:** To keep growing, advancing or improving in knowledge, skills, character, or life experience
- Supportiveness: To be helpful, encouraging and available to myself or others
- Trust: To be loyal, faithful, sincere and reliable


Skillsroad - a career exploration website

ABS Labour Force Data - March 2023

The Australian Bureau of Statistics has released its Labour Force Data for March 2023 with headline estimates of employment, unemployment, underemployment, participation and hours worked from the monthly Labour Force Survey.

Key statistics In trend terms, in March 2023 were:

- unemployment rate remained at 3.5%.
- participation rate increased to 66.8%.
- employment increased to 13,883,100.
- employment to population ratio remained at 64.4%.
- underemployment rate increased to 6.1%.
- monthly hours worked increased to 1,910 million.

Australian Skills Classification

The Australian Skills Classification helps define the skills that underpin jobs in Australia. The Classification identifies three types of skills for every occupation: specialist tasks, technology tools and core competencies. Similar specialist tasks are grouped together into skills clusters, which are further grouped into skills cluster families. You can explore the data by skills cluster or by occupation. The cost of a VET qualification

The Good Universities Guide reports that in the Vocational Education and Training (VET) sector, tuition costs depend on a number of things. The main factors that determine the amount you will pay are the fee structure of the VET course you are studying and the type of place you receive. Domestic VET students studying at diploma level or above are eligible for the federal government's VET FEE-HELP scheme, which can be used to help cover part, or all, of the tuition fees for a course. First Nations Peoples Admission to Griffith Uni

Griffith University offers admission pathways for applicants who identify as Australian Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander. Applicants are assessed on formal qualifications, life experiences and other transferable skills. Applicants are encouraged to identify when they apply via QTAC or UAC so they can be considered for Griffith's dedicated pathway options if they are not meeting the standard admission criteria. Once a student, the GUMURRII Student Support Unit can also provide ongoing assistance from orientation through to graduation.

First Peoples Health Pathway

The First Peoples Health Pathway has approved entry for the following programs: Bachelor of Dental Health Science, Bachelor of Medical Science, Bachelor of Midwifery, Bachelor of Physiotherapy, Bachelor of Paramedicine. Applicants apply through QTAC and are then invited to be considered under this pathway. Applicants will be considered based on:

- academic achievement minimum ATAR or equivalent
- meeting subject prerequisites
- interview







Applicants will be asked to provide additional documentation which includes:

- confirmation of heritage
- personal resume including referees and details of achievement and experience
- a brief statement outlining reasons for wanting to study their chosen program

QUT entry pathway for First Nations Peoples students

Students who are of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander descent may be eligible for entry through QUT's Centralised Assessment Selection Program (CASP) which takes into account commitment to study, work and community experiences. Financial and study support is also available. Visit their website for more information and an understanding of the eligibility and application requirements.

Scholarships for First Nations Peoples

- Bond University scholarships, valued up to 50% of tuition fees for any single undergraduate degree (excluding the Medical Program) and are awarded to Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander students who have demonstrated extracurricular involvement, leadership potential, academic achievements and connection to their Indigenous heritage. Applications for 2024 scholarships will open on 2 May 2023 and close on 5 September 2023.



Additional entry requirement for teaching courses

If you are nominating Teaching as one of your QTAC preferences, you must meet academic and nonacademic entry requirements. Academic entry requirements include subject prerequisites and an ATAR minimum selection threshold. You can find academic entry requirements for each course in Course Search (update your information once QTAC has updated their 2024 course information). If you do not submit the additional entry requirements, you won't be considered for a place in teaching at any institution. Contact the relevant institution for more information on what qualifications and prerequisites are accepted for entry to initial teacher education courses. Do your preparation early so you are not rushed during the more stressful time later in the year.

Adjustment Factors – How can they assist me?

Adjustment Factors help you enter university courses. If you are eligible for Adjustment Factors your position on the merit scale for entry into a course will be 'adjusted' to give you a new, more competitive score.

Universities award Adjustment Factors for a variety of reasons and programs so you will have to enquire to every university you are interested in attending, to fully understand their eligibility requirements. The process for applying for 'Adjustment Factors' may vary so it's important that you start your research now.

Year 12: Time is passing quickly - time to start organising

Time is moving quickly, and you will need to be seriously researching your course preferences for your QTAC application. You need to begin serious planning for 2024 if you haven't already started. If you haven't a clue where to start or aren't aware of your options, make an appointment with your school Guidance Officer/Counsellor ASAP. Some opportunities to assist you are:

- From May to September most of the institutions have open days where you can get information about courses and check out the campuses.
- You will receive the *QTAC Guide* in June/July. It contains information about courses you can apply for through QTAC and application processes.
- 15 16 July 2023 <u>Tertiary Studies Expo</u> (TSXPO) at the RNA showgrounds. Interstate universities will be represented at this expo.
- From August 2023, you can access a range of up-to-date information about the 2023/24
 QTAC application and offer processes and the courses offered from the QTAC website.
- 26 & 27 May 2023 <u>Brisbane Careers and Employment Expo</u> at the Brisbane Convention and Exhibition Centre. Also, careers' expos will be held in regional centres throughout Queensland (see previous bulletin or the Options calendar for dates).

Take advantage of all these opportunities to plan your immediate future. 30 September 2023 is the final date to apply for some courses through QTAC so, when you get your 2024 QTAC book check it carefully for critical dates.



International students wanting to study at a university

If you are needing to gain the prerequisite of English and/or may not achieve a pass in a senior English subject at the end of 2023, you could sit and gain an appropriate grade in one of the following tests:

<u>IELTS</u> – International English Language Testing System

TOEFL - Test of English as a Foreign Language

Pearson Test of English

Some specific health related courses may require students from a non English speaking background to pass one of the above tests in order to gain professional registration. Each university has its own English proficiency requirements so check with each institution's policies as to what qualification they will accept.

Not sure what the terms mean?

ACU have put together some information about terms you will see when you are researching and applying for tertiary entry in 2024. The definitions are appropriate in the majority of cases across all universities. <u>Click here</u> to find commonly used terms and their definitions some of which are:

- Undergraduate When you start uni, you are an undergraduate student working towards your bachelor or associate degree.
- Unit or course A subject within a program or course. Each subject or unit has a specified number of credit points that count towards a degree.
- Selection rank This is a ranking used to assess your admission to a course. Your course selection rank can include your ATAR, any adjustment factors you might be eligible for and any other contributions such as, VET qualifications or STAT results.

Uni essentials: Tax File Number and Unique Student Identifier

Year 12 students planning to go to university should apply early for a <u>Tax File Number (TFN)</u> and a <u>Unique Student Identifier (USI)</u>. To be eligible for HECS-HELP or FEE-HELP (Commonwealth assistance), students must provide a TFN and a USI on their Commonwealth Assistance Form once they become a student. All universities and TAFE Queensland require you to have a TFN and USI and you can read more about <u>QUT fees and HECS-HELP</u> or visit the government <u>StudyAssist website</u>.

Provisional entry into Medicine update

If you're in your final year of high school (Queensland Year 12 or equivalent), you can apply for the Provisional Entry pathway. The minimum entry requirements for this pathway are:

- Queensland Year 12 English or <u>equivalent</u>
- an adjusted ATAR 95.00 or equivalent or higher
- a competitive <u>University Clinical Aptitude Test for Australia and New Zealand (UCAT ANZ)</u> aggregate score from the year you apply
- a multiple mini interview (MMI).

You'll need to sit the UCAT ANZ before you apply. The minimum required UCAT ANZ aggregate score depends on the performance of applicants and available places in the MD program. For the 2022 intake, the aggregate score for a Commonwealth Supported Place was 2610. This score varies each year and can't be determined in advance. UCAT has a significant impact on whether you gain a place in the provisional entry program, so you need to study, practice and ask for assistance when necessary.

After you apply, if you're eligible for the next stage, you'll be invited to a MMI. Meeting the minimum entry requirements does not guarantee admission.


