What is a school-based apprenticeship or traineeship?

School-based apprentices and trainees, usually in Years 10, 11 and 12, are trained in their chosen apprenticeship or traineeship, in the workplace and through a training organization, while continuing to study towards their Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) at school. To commence a school-based apprenticeship or traineeship (SAT), a student must have the support of the employer, the school, a supervising registered training organisation and their parent/guardian. Financial Assistance & Scholarships

Financial help if you're 24 or younger and a student or Australian Apprentice

Youth Allowance is a financial payment from the Australian Government to support students and Australian apprentices while they gain their qualifications. To get this, you must be one of the following:

- 18 to 24 and studying full time
- 16 to 17, studying full time and either independent or needing to live away from home to study
- 16 to 17, studying full time and have completed year 12 or equivalent
- 16 to 24 and doing a full time Australian Apprenticeship.

Open day checklist from the Good Universities Guide

Open day season has started! Open Days give you a chance to find out about life at a university that you are interested in and answers to any questions you have. The following is a guide for attending open days and will be of great assistance when you plan your open day visit.

What to do on the day

In and amongst the freebies, food and entertainment, there are a few key things you should do on the day.

- Take a tour of the campus and facilities
- Collect brochures, course guides and other useful information for further reading
- Talk to students and staff and ask plenty of questions
- Attend information sessions for courses or faculties of interest

Key questions to ask staff and students about courses

- What are the entry requirements? Are there any prerequisite subjects or additional requirements (such as a portfolio or interview)?
- How much time can you expect to spend in classes each week? How many hours will need to be dedicated to study outside of class?
- What are the most common forms of assessment (for example: exams, group projects or essays)?
- Where are graduates of the course working now? What are some typical career paths?
- Are there opportunities for practical learning, work experience or internships?
- Are there any pathway options to help you gain entry to the course?
- Does the course offer a pathway to further study?
- Are double degrees available?
- Does the university have any industry connections in the field?
- How much choice is there in subject selection? Are there opportunities to study elective subjects?

Key questions to ask staff and students about the university

- What facilities are available on campus?
- What support services are offered to students?
- Are there accommodation options on campus or nearby?
- Does the university offer any scholarships?
- Does the university have any exchange agreements with institutions overseas?
- Does the university provide assistance with finding work after graduation?

Key questions to ask staff and students about student life

- What clubs and societies are on offer?
- Are there opportunities to socialise on campus?
- Is there a student union? What services and activities does the union coordinate?

Other things to consider







- **Getting there**: Is the campus easy to get to? Can you catch public transport? If you plan to drive, what are the parking options around the campus?
- Accommodation: For those planning on moving out of home to study, consider having a look around the local area for potential neighbourhoods to live in or take a tour of on-campus accommodation.
- **Facilities**: What facilities are available on and around campus? Look at food options, gyms, banks, medical centres, libraries and any other facilities you consider important. It's also worth investigating the practical facilities available for your course, such as laboratories and studios.

OTAC & Tentiany Entry

Rumours, Myths, and legends from QTAC

Rumour: The Queensland ATAR can include other inputs like IB subjects, Music and Dance qualifications, Certificate I and II qualifications...

Reality: The ATAR can only include General subjects, Applied Subject, Completed VET qualifications at Certificate III level and higher. The ATAR must include at least 4 General subjects.

Rumour: Some Mathematics subjects scale better for ATARs.

Reality: The difficulty of a subject has nothing to do with how well it will scale! How a subject scales is dependent on the achievement of students in all their subjects (including their Mathematics subject).

Rumour: It is possible to game the system to get the highest ATAR

Reality: The ATAR is entirely data driven. ATAR is a rank, so if a student's results place them in the top percentile, then they will get the top ATAR.

Reality: their subjects.	NO - A student can only maximise their ATAR by performing well in all

Myths and Legends I will not qualify for an ATAR so higher education is closed off to me.







Reality: Some tertiary courses are accessible without a formal tertiary ranking like ATAR. There are other pathways to tertiary study, including via VET. Check with the institutions/Uni's you are interested in to see what they pathway options are.

The difference between QCE and ATAR

QTAC states that the Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) and the ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admission Rank) are different and have different purposes. QCE certifies learning, ie shows a student's academic achievement and at what standard they achieved in each subject during their senior schooling. The QCE may be considered by employers and the general community. ATAR indicates a student's position (or ranking) compared to all other students in the state. The only intended purpose for the ATAR is to assist with selecting applicants for tertiary study. The new IBAS Combined Rank Schedule

QTAC Selection Ranks and ATARs both have scales from 0.00 to 99.95. This means that IB graduates receiving an IBAS that equates to a QTAC Selection Rank of 99.75 on the new Combined Schedule, will be considered for tertiary admissions alongside students who received an ATAR of 99.75.

Students with a completed IB Diploma are considered for tertiary study through QTAC on the basis of having met 'Eligibility', requirements (minimum course entry for their desired tertiary course, such as subject prerequisites, auditions, portfolios or interviews) and 'Merit', QTAC Selection Rank (In this case IB Diploma, other examples are ATAR and VET Qualifications). 

The timetable will be updated in Term 3 to include language and non-language Senior External Examinations (SEEs). SEEs are 100% external examinations and are different from the mainstream General subjects offered to adult learners and eligible Year 12 students. - 6. The Full-Out Panic You suddenly realise how much work you have to do and completely freak out, ripping up pages and curling into a ball under your desk.

VET qualifications for tertiary selection

Successfully completed VET qualifications, at a certificate III level or higher, may be used for tertiary selection in two ways:

- an input into an Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR), and/or
- a stand-alone qualification for tertiary admission at some universities (may apply to non-ATAR eligible applicants)







Education institutions may allocate a selection rank depending on the level of VET qualification completed. Click <u>here</u> to see a guide (scroll down) to the approximate selection rank allocated to each level of qualification. Contact your preferred university or institution to confirm their current guidelines regarding VET admissions. Additional admissions policies may also apply for recent Year 12 graduates with completed VET qualifications, such as meeting prerequisites. Additional entry requirements for Nursing and/or Midwifery

To enrol in Nursing and/or Midwifery at any university you must meet the following educational requirements: you must have attended and satisfactorily completed at least 6 years of primary and/or secondary education taught and assessed solely in English. At least two years of this education must have been between grades 7 and 12. This education must have been completed in one of the following countries: Australia, Canada, New Zealand, Republic of Ireland, South Africa, United Kingdom, United States of America. If you do not meet these educational requirements, you are required to provide evidence of an acceptable English Language test. For more information see English Language Proficiency.

What can I do with my ATAR?

Your ATAR makes you competitive for entry into university programs and other pathways. Undergraduate degrees have different ATAR/tertiary selection rank requirements. Most UQ undergraduate programs show a minimum ATAR threshold as part of their entry requirements.
