On 14 October Australia will vote in 'The Voice' referendum. If you are 18 years old, it will be the first time you will vote and being able to vote should never be taken for granted. *Options Career Information* is not telling you how you should vote but we do strongly encourage you to be well informed so that when you do place your vote, you know why you voted Yes or No. So it's time to do some quality research other than on social media.

Queensland Government's incentives, costs and financial support for apprenticeships and traineeships

<u>The Queensland Government</u> has several funding programs to assist employers, apprentices and trainees to build their skills in Queensland. These include:

<u>User Choice:</u> This program provides a public funded contribution towards the cost of training and assessment services for eligible Queensland apprentices and trainees with funding aligned to the skills needs of industry.

<u>Wages and conditions:</u> Learn more about your wages, conditions of employment and your employer's workplace requirements, including safety at work and supervision in the workplace.

<u>Free apprenticeships</u> Funding to cover the full cost of training with a training provider when you choose a high priority apprenticeship or traineeship. Just choose the qualification you want, land an apprenticeship or traineeship with an employer and they will cover the cost of you training. Your employer will pay your wages but you might have to meet costs related to any uniform or other training resources.

Eligible qualifications under Free apprenticeships for under 25s

Here you will find a list of the eligible qualifications under the Free apprenticeships for under 25s program.

<u>Skilling Queenslanders for Work</u> Under Skilling Queenslanders for Work, you may be able to commence an apprenticeship or traineeship at a reduced or no cost.

<u>Cost of training</u> Training costs can include travel, accommodation, uniforms, equipment, text books, materials, tuition costs, parking or transport costs.

<u>Financial support including Travel and accommodation subsidy, Youth Allowance, Austudy and ABSTUDY, Financial support and loans, living away from home allowance, disability support.</u>

Training is a key part of an apprenticeship and traineeship

Apprenticeships and traineeships are competency based which is a combination of formal learning and workplace training which gives you the ability to apply skills and knowledge, even in new situations and environments. You gain experience and training on-the-job with your employer and complete formal training towards a nationally recognised qualification with a Registered Training Organisation. 

Australian Stockholm Junior Water Prize 2024

The Australian Stockholm Junior Water Prize is an annual water science competition for high school students. Students are challenged to create solutions for water challenges, with the national prize awarded at Ozwater. The winner of the Australian competition is invited to participate in the Stockholm Junior Water Prize. The competition is open to high school students who have conducted water-related projects of environmental, scientific, social or technological importance. Students may enter as individuals or groups of two. Submissions close on 1 March 2024 and click here for tool and information kits and entry details.

The Australian Computational and Linguistics Olympiad (OZCLO)

This contest is for high school students from Years 7 – 12. Participants work in teams of four on a range of language-analysis problems. The competition is held at the school with teams submitting their answers through an online quiz. Some regions offer offline alternatives. Visit the website to learn more about the 2024 competition. Disabled Australian Apprentice Wage Support Program

Disabled Australian Apprentice Wage Support Program is a payment that assists employers of eligible Australian Apprentices with disabilities. For more information about this disability program or questions on employment help for job seekers with a disability, illness, or injury, <u>call</u> the People With Disability line or visit a <u>service centre</u>.

Employment Assistance Fund

Help is available through the <u>Employment Assistance Fund (EAF)</u> which gives financial aid to eligible people so they can buy work related modifications, equipment, help and services. It is good to tell prospective employers that they can access the EAF through Disability Employment Services or job active organisations.

Tertiary study applicants with a disability

If you have a disability, tertiary institutions have services and facilities available such as:

- help with physical access needs
- access to specialised technology and equipment
- sign language interpreters
- note-taking services.

The level of help available is assessed by the institution's disability officer or similar. You should contact the relevant institution and discuss with them what you need. Click <u>here</u> to find out more along with a list of the institutions' disability support services.

Australia's booming film and television industry creates jobs for below-the-line crew



QTAC application number for scholarship applications

You may need your QTAC application number when applying for scholarships. This number was on the last screen of your QTAC application after you have paid the application fee. It is also in your application confirmation email and in your online QTAC Account information section of your application.





QUT Scholarships

QUT offers a wide range of scholarships to future students. Application processes can differ, so it is important that you are across the requirements and key dates for each scholarship. Below is a selection of scholarships on offer for 2024.

- QUT Business School's <u>Corporate Partners in Excellence Scholarship (CPIE)</u>, worth \$42,000 in 2024, combines academic rigour, networking and professional development opportunities with two career-launching semester-long internships. Applications are now open and close Sunday 8 October.
- QUT Business School's <u>Dean's Scholars Program</u> brings together academically-talented peers
 in a structured program designed to sustain academic excellence and inspire an interest in
 research. Students who place the Bachelor of Business (Dean's Scholars Program) as their
 first QTAC preference and receive an offer to the course are automatically entitled to a
 scholarship offer.
- Twenty <u>Faculty of Business and Law Excellence Scholarships (FBL)</u> will be offered to commencing Business, Law, and Property Economics students who achieve a minimum unadjusted ATAR of 95.00 and place a related QUT degree as their top QTAC preference. FBL Excellence scholars receive \$5,000 in their first year of study, automatic membership to the College of Excellence and priority access to student leadership opportunities and case competitions. No application is required.
- Applications for QUT's <u>Women in Engineering Scholarship</u> are now open and close Monday 11 December. The scholarship is valued at \$6,000, paid over two years. Students who identify as female, plan to start university in 2024 and have QUT Engineering as their first preference are eligible to apply.

Generation Z: life at 22

Longitudinal Surveys of Australian Youth (LSAY) has developed their latest infographic in their series <u>Generation Z: life at 22</u>. It explores how young people fared when they were 22 years old in 2022. At age 22, young Australians are transitioning from study into full-time work, and many are already in the job they want as a career. Results from the surveys also show young Australians are experiencing increasing rates of financial stress and probable mental illness.

Longitudinal Surveys of Australian Youth (LSAY) 2015 cohort (Y15) 2022 data now available

The latest data for the Y15 cohort is now available and includes results from the 2022 (wave 8) surveys when respondents were on average 22 years old. Last year's surveys collected information about young people's post-school education and training, work, income, health, financial stress and their living arrangements. USI: All you need to know

The USI (Unique Student Identifier) is a student's individual education number for life. From January 2023 the USI will be mandatory for all higher education students graduating in 2023 or beyond. You need a USI if you are:

- a higher education student graduating in 2023 or beyond
- undertaking Nationally Recognised Training (e.g., VET qualifications)
- a higher education student seeking Commonwealth financial assistance (e.g., a HECS-HELP loan)
- an international student studying onshore in Australia







Australian school students need to create a USI before they apply for tertiary study. There is no minimum age requirement to create a USI so senior students are encouraged to create their USIs. Your USI and LUI numbers are NOT THE SAME THING. Find out more about the USI on the Australian Government website <u>usi.gov.au</u>



You can check for updates as well as ask questions using social media. QTAC is active on Facebook, X, and Instagram.

Did you use the 'desired – back-up - pathway' plan when organising your preferences?

Go to the QTAC website and P9 in your QTAC Guide for information about this plan. Your sixth preference should be one that you have a very good chance of gaining entry, given its previous adjusted ATAR/rank threshold and your results. You also need to check the offer round dates of your preferences and make changes if the dates differ (preferences need to be chronologically organised according to the offer round of the courses you are applying for). Courses you are offered in early offer rounds can be conditionally accepted and you can change your preferences for subsequent offer rounds if necessary. Have you deleted all wasted courses? Wasted courses include those that:

- You do not meet the entry requirements
- You would not do if you got an offer for them
- Located in regional centres that you have not consulted your parents/guardians about
- Are too difficult or impossible to commute to given where you live
- Are very competitive and you listed them below much less competitive courses

How to Respond to an offer

Visit the QTAC Offers webpage for specific information about responding to your offer. It is essential that you respond by the due date (within four (4) days of receiving your offer). If you don't, your offer will lapse, and you will not be considered for any other offer rounds. When you receive an offer, you have four response options to choose from (find them using the link earlier in the article). If you choose 'Reject offer' - this option will see your QTAC application no longer active.







For the first three response options above, you can accept, reject or <u>defer</u> your offer. If you do miss a due date, contact QTAC ASAP. Also, it may not be wise to reject an offer. If you are considering doing this, first contact QTAC on 1300 467 822 to discuss this move. For more information about responding to offers visit the QTAC <u>website</u>.

Key dates for QTAC applications

If you haven't yet applied, consider applying as soon as possible and before Term Four becomes totally hectic (as it will). The absolute final date to apply for courses commencing in Semester One, 2024 is:

17 November 2023	10 November 2023	not applicable
21 December 2023 2023	7 December 2023	12pm, 18 December
11 January 2024 2024	8 December 2023	11.59pm, 3 January

Click <u>here</u> for a full list of the QTAC deadlines. However, you need to be aware that by these dates, many of the courses with <u>fixed closing dates</u> are no longer available and some Year 12 students will have already received early offers.

Manage your application - Did I get an offer?

After you have lodged your application, it is a good idea to use <u>Application Services</u> to go back into your application from time to time to:

- Update your contact details Phone QTAC on 1300 467 822 to change your name, date of birth, citizenship status, gender, Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander, Maori, Pasifika or Australian South Sea Islander status, gender or qualification details.
- See if you have received any correspondence from QTAC about your application
- See if you are meeting the entry requirements
- See if you have submitted any and all necessary additional documentation
- See if you get an offer?
- Q&A section

QTAC will usually communicate with you using the email address on your application (this should be your personal email - not your school email). Get into the habit of checking your emails regularly. Think of linking your emails to your smart phone to make it easy for you to regularly check. Read Pages 13 of your QTAC book for more information.

It is recommended that Year 12 students apply to QTAC early. Some courses have early and/or fixed closing dates which must be met, and you can find these on Page 18 of your 2024 QTAC Guide. Also, if you are competitive (ATAR results) you may be offered a place before the major offer round in January. View the key dates <a href="https://example.com/here/be/







What happens if I defer my QTAC offer?

Deferment lets you delay starting your course. Usually, you can defer for up to a year, but some institutions let you defer for longer while others do not allow deferment. In most cases, you can defer when you respond to your QTAC offer and the institution will contact you to advise what to do next. See page 14 in your QTAC book or click here to find each institutions' deferment policy.

Year 12 Subject Adjustment Schemes

Some universities offer adjustment factors when you successfully complete specific subjects in Year 12. Adjustment factors are additional selection ranks that make you more competitive for entry into your nominated course. Each university has its own scheme. You don't have to apply for these schemes as adjustment factors are automatically applied through QTAC. School subject adjustment factors only apply to Year 12 qualifications (e.g., ATAR and IB and some non-ATAR pathways) on leaving school. External assessment info

If you are studying QCAA General subjects, you will sit external assessments at the end of Year 12 as part of your assessment for each subject. External assessments are subject-based written exams that are:

- common to all schools
- summative they count towards your final subject result for QCAA General subjects
- developed and marked by the QCAA.



Certificate 3 Guarantee

The Certificate 3 Guarantee supports eligible people to complete a first, post-school Certificate III qualification. The program also supports school students to access training and Queensland's Year 12 graduates to transition to employment by providing free training in high priority qualifications. The Certificate 3 Guarantee is targeted at Certificate III qualifications because they are considered the entry-level qualification most often needed to gain employment in many industry sectors. Early offers

Offers made through Universities' Early Offer schemes for Year 12 are mostly being made by QTAC, however, some are made directly from the institution. Your options are; accepting the offer outright, accepting the offer conditionally or deferring (depending on the university). Check with the university directly or contact QTAC.

If you accept an early offer outright, your QTAC application will stop there, as you have accepted an offer. If a university does allow you to conditionally accept an early offer and you choose this option, to be considered for a preferred course in future offer rounds, you need to go back into your QTAC application and reorder your course preferences. Eligibility requirements for Nursing/Midwifery and Teaching courses

If you are considering studying to be a nurse or teacher don't forget to complete the additional eligibility requirements for all courses relating to nursing, midwifery and teaching. Remember, when applying to these courses, you may have a competitive ATAR/selection rank and satisfy subject prerequisites, however you will not be considered for an offer if you do not comply with additional eligibility requirements relevant to their course. Click on Nursing/Midwifery and Teaching Entry for more information.

Fast track options - are they suitable for you?

Most institutions use a semester system with two periods of study: the first from around March to June, followed by a short winter break and the second from around July to November, followed by a long summer break. Some institutions and courses have a third period of study that takes place during the traditional summer break. These three periods are called trimesters. By cramming an extra semester's worth of material into each year, students can graduate from their course in a







quicker time (for example, a standard three-year bachelor's degree may be completed in two years). These accelerated options are known as "fast-tracked" courses. The Good Universities Guide has put together an article that sets out the positives and negatives of the fast-track option so you can decide if it's for you.

Find the institutions that offer the degree/s you are keen on

<u>Course Seeker</u> is an Australian Government initiative where you can search and compare thousands of courses from different institutions across Australia. The website displays course information, entry requirements, admission processes, student satisfaction and graduate survey results. It is particularly helpful if you are thinking of studying interstate.

If you're a current Year 12 student and you're not eligible for an ATAR, you won't receive a selection rank for your secondary studies. If you apply to start studying at UQ in the year after you finish Year 12, you can only use your secondary education qualification to gain an entry score.

JCU

If you completed a Certificate III or a Certificate IV qualification while at school, you are guaranteed entry into a number of JCU undergraduate courses. Some courses require additional subject prerequisites to be met and are detailed in the Handbook found on each course page.


